NEWS FROM OUR CHURCHES: SAMARITAN'S PURSE

I was originally thinking we'd be able to maybe pack 25 boxes, then I attended my first ever project leader event and set my outrageous goal of 100 boxes, just praying to pack 50. Our church and community showed up!"







Demetria shares "This picture is packs of fabric we were able to put together. The handprint was cut out and glued to the back of a card front and placed in each box. The one picture is of the men using an electric drill to wind fishing line on cardboard pieces for the fishing kits. Our goal was to mainly pack for the 10–14-year-olds. I've got the drive and have already started purchasing items and planning for next year."









Mason Dixon Baptist Church packed 202 boxes.





Amanda Felton wrote:
"We had about 40 people at our packing party, and it took us about an hour and a half to fill 101 boxes."

The remainder of the boxes were packed by individuals in the church and brought to the church.

Mason Dixon took a group to the OCC Baltimore County Processing Center to help get OCC boxes ready for shipping.



<u>Stewartstown Baptist</u> reported through their pastor Tim Parker that they collected 64 boxes this year. 54 boxes were packed at the church and 10 boxes were packed online.

<u>Shrewsbury Baptist Church</u> collected 36 boxes. Pastor Knott said, "What a blessing those boxes will be to children."

Another 23 shoebox gifts were individually packed, bringing their church total to 263. The "Follow Your Box" look-up tool says that their shoeboxes are headed to Suriname, Burundi, and Uganda.



It was also their third year serving as a drop-off center during National Collection Week, Nov 15-22. They were thrilled to collect a total of 861 shoebox gifts, about 40% more than last year!



They also took a team of 10

people for a work shift at the Baltimore Processing Center on Monday, November 29th. They inspected gifts, sorted inappropriate items, worked with filler items, and boxed shoeboxes into their designated cartons by gender and by age.

It's All About Jesus

Leading up to Christmas, I'm sure by now that you are having visions of sugar-plums dancing in your head, but I want to share with you some of the ways that we can

We can share with unbelievers why we have the tradition of giving presents to each other. It's from the Bible. When Jesus was born, wisemen came bringing gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. This year at New Life we are more focused on living out the "ministry of presence"— simply being there for students without having a formal agenda when we meet. Sometimes girls come over for lunch and end up staying for several hours, just talking about life and their faith, and asking questions about what I'm learning and growing in in my own life and faith journey.

In our large weekly club meetings, we have been going through the names of God (different descriptors of Him that we see used throughout the Bible), featuring a different name each month. PASTORS:

Immediate Action Needed: The Pennsylvania Department of State Bureau of Corporations and Charitable Organizations requires that all non profit organizations file a "Decennial Report of Continued Existence" by December 31, 2021. If your church fails to do so, it will no longer have exclusive use of its name. This means that, while the non-filing entity continues to exist, its name becomes available for the use of any other business registering in PA.

To find out if you need to report, look at the website: https://www.dos.pa.gov/decennialreport. There is a \$70.00 fee for registering.
