





NEWS FROM OUR CHURCHES:

<u>Carlisle Baptist Church</u> is working in partnership with Hamilton Elementary School to minister to the needs of the staff, parents, and students. There are 400 students at Hamilton with 82% considered living in poverty. They are currently providing rides to medical appointments for students and parents. They are praying for the staff and providing "treats" for them twice monthly. Beginning this fall 2022 semester their plans are to:

- Participate with students by reading & homework program after school.
- Create and hold parenting classes in the Fall and Spring semesters.
- Partner with Middlesex United Methodist's "Happy Feet Program" providing a needy child with a shirt, pants or dress, socks and underwear and a pair of shoes.
- Provide volunteers to walk kids to school so they don't have to walk alone to Good News Club.

<u>Slavic Baptist Church:</u> continues to work on sending relief to those in Ukraine. Pastor Kitsen shares "I greet you, friends! Us, as people, emigrants from Ukraine. Since the first days of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, we have been very engaged in volunteer assistance for Ukraine. We have already done a lot; we still don't stop. We continue to do what we can. We have already sent a total of more than 15 tons of various aid - medicines, clothes, food, etc. and financial support. Now we are sending a group of 3 people with funds to the Polish



Ukrainian border. There are still approximately 7-10 tons of aid on the church grounds, ready to be sent. More than \$100,000 have passed through our church fund for helping Ukraine. Every day we have family prayers. Every church service we have a kneeling prayer for Ukraine, soldiers, volunteers and just people, the inhabitants of Ukraine. We also pray for the captive people and for the ministries of Christians in Ukraine. We ask God to stop this war and bloodshed with it. With the help of God, we do what we can."

A WORD FROM BRAD ~

Spiritual Refugees

We are seeing more and more refugees in our world today and more are coming to the United States, but isn't our government and other NGO's helping all of these immigrants with all they need?

While our government and other NGO's do provide for many of the physical needs of refugees, it is the church that is responsible for the spiritual needs of the refugees and unbelievers in general.

Jesus said in Matthew 11:28, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest."

This is the message we need to be sharing with those who are "Far from God". If you think about it, most unbelievers that we know are carrying around with them very heavy burdens. The Bible says that they are carrying their sins, which is a huge burden. We know that they are fighting against God Himself, and in some instances, they are running from God.

Sharing the words of Jesus from Matthew's Gospel, telling unbelievers that they can come to Jesus, and He will take those burdens from them. This is the message that we will share with the Ukrainian refugees on our KBA mission trip to Poland, April 23-30. Yes, governments are helping the refugees with some of their physical needs, but it's the church (believers) that have the responsibility for telling the good news that Jesus died for their sins and wants to forgive their sins. The Ukrainian refugees that we will be ministering to at the Polish border with Ukraine are not carrying a lot of physical baggage, but many of them are carrying huge spiritual baggage. Many understand that they are in a right relationship with God, but in reality, it is just a religious belief system. They have yet to believe in Jesus as their Lord and Savior. Thank you for praying as we go and serve, but the lost are around all of us, carrying heavy burdens and waiting to hear from us that Jesus can take those burdens.

NEW LIFE AT PENN STATE: ERIC REIBER

In early March, college students from Baptist Ministries across the state converged on York County to work on homes impacted by Hurricane Ida last fall. The basements had been flooded and damaged from the constant rain from the storms. In last fall, crews went in to pump out



water and do demolition to the flooded portions, but there has been little follow up since the fall. Disaster Relief Director, Kenton Hunt, coordinated with the York County Recovery team to put the students on the needed sites for work.

Students from Penn State, Delaware Valley University, Montgomery County Community College, and Clarion University spent four days working in two homes in the York region. The students filled holes, put in insulation, and put on new drywall. It is a beautiful thing to see this generation give from their free time to serve the Kingdom.



I want to say a special thanks to some KBA churches that helped with the trip. Country and Town Baptist housed the group on cots in their youth rooms as well as fed the students as they arrived on the first day. Red Land Baptist provided another meal during the week for the group of seventeen.

The trip left a lasting impression that led to fruit. First, students bonded with students from other BRN Next ministries to encourage each other. There are many stories of the team sharing their testimonies with one another and praying for each other. Secondly, it was great to see the cooperation of the missionaries and churches who all together made this trip possible. The Spring Break trip were
