A Word from Brad: Evangelism: Hunting or Fishing?

Some like to hunt and some like to fish, but in evangelism, fishing is the preferred method. Jesus called the disciples to fish, but never told us to hunt for people. What's the difference?

Hunting is based on confrontation, a "Go out there and shoot them" mentality. You take your best shot and it's all over. In hunting, a hunter scares off the animal if he misses. The animal has no choice, and the hunter must take a skilled shot to "make the kill."

Fishing, on the other hand, is based on attraction and you "entice them to nibble on your bait." You are able to try all kinds of lures and you get more than one chance. The fish gets a choice in fishing and there is no practice or training necessary, as anyone can put bait into the water.

So, when you begin to pray for your next disciple, think about going fishing instead of hunting. After all, Jesus said, "Come, follow me, and I will show you how to fish for people."

Here are a few keys to spiritual fishing.

First, we need to identify our pond. Your pond to fish is where you are located. Start where you are and share with those closest to you. The Bible calls this your sphere of influence. It's usually those who you already know, but it's people that are around you. Mark 5:19 says, "Go home to your family and tell them how much the Lord has done for you and how he has had mercy on you."

Second, you need to think like the fish in your pond. For example, fishermen say that you never fish with the sun at your back. Fish will see your shadow and won't bite. Paul says in 1 Corinthians 9:20-23, "To the Jews I became like a Jew to win the Jews. . . To those who are without the law I became like a person who is with the law. . . To those who are weak, I became weak so I could win the weak. I have become all things to all people so I could save some of them in any way possible." Understanding who you wish to disciple goes a long way.

Third, remember that fish get hungry at different times. Colossians 4:5 says, "Be wise in the way you act toward those who are not believers." This is called receptivity. This is how open people are to the Good News about Jesus. Ephesians 2:17 talks about people who are close to God, and some are far away. "He has brought this Good News of peace to you Gentiles who were very far away from him, and to us Jews who were near." For example, a person who has recently experienced some type of trauma (death in the family, lost a job, divorce, etc.) is more open to hearing about hope, love, and forgiveness. Lastly, we need to be intentional. Nothing happens unless we intentionally seek to be around those who so desperately need to hear the Good News of Jesus.

So, let's go fishing for Jesus! ~ Brad
