Second, we have the greatest news ever written about in all of history. This news is fact and is not for sale today and then in our trashcans tomorrow. This news is eternal, containing only truth and no lies or speculation about people or events. We should be as eager as newsboys in the 1930's to tell about Jesus, and yet most don't share the good news of Jesus. Why is that? Do they really believe that Jesus is good news and that people want to hear it? God has called us to be modern day newsboys, talking to all we meet about Jesus.

Thirdly, we know how to reach our area with the gospel, the good news of Jesus. One morning a young man stood near the ocean and saw on the beach thousands of starfish that had washed ashore during a storm the night before. His heart was heavy because he knew they would all

soon die, having no protection from the sun's strong rays. In the distance, the young man saw an elderly man pick up one starfish and throw it back into the ocean. He suddenly understood that he couldn't help all the starfish, but he could help some: the ones he picked up and threw back into the ocean.

We can reach our area with the gospel by making a difference in a person's life one at a time. But we must be intentional, just as this young man was intentional. Once he knew how, he made a decision to bend down, pick up just one starfish and throw it back into the ocean. When he saw how successful it was, his next step might have been to make a plan to stop at the beach in the morning a few days a week and see if there were any opportunities to help other starfish that had gotten caught. In the same way, we have to be intentional about making a plan to talk about Jesus with that one person that God has put on our heart.

We can reach south-central PA with the gospel, but it starts with each one of us finding that one person that we can pray for, meet with, and share with them about the greatest news of all time. Isn't the good news of Jesus more important than the news that newsboys used to shout out about on the streets a hundred years ago? Blessings!
