Word from Brad: Raising Up the Next Generation

When I was a little boy, I wanted to grow up to be a policeman. My parents listened to me and even encouraged my dream by buying a play gun, badge, and cowboy boots (a necessity for being a policeman in Texas).

But what if my parents had told me that being a pastor or missionary and following God was a way that God could use me to make an eternal difference? What if they had encouraged me in that endeavor?

I believe that we can be intentional and raise up a generation of pastors and missionaries. We can bring them up in the Lord and following Him. We can make it cool again for our children to serve God in following Him in full-time ministry. So that our kids' heroes are Noah, Moses, Abraham, King David, Elijah, Peter, and Paul? So that more of our kids want to serve on the front lines like Lottie Moon, William Carey, David Livingston, or Jim Elliot?

What if our kids to listened to great preachers like Billy Graham, Chuck Swindoll, John MacArthur, Adrian Rodgers, or David Jeremiah?

What if we helped our kids to read and memorize scripture, or if we prayed with them every day, or read the Bible to them, or held a family devotional time 5 days a week?

Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up. Tie them as symbols on your hands and bind them on your foreheads. Write them on the doorframes of your houses and on your gates."

The Apostle Paul poured into Timothy and trained him up to do the work of an evangelist.

Let's be intentional about raising up the next generation, whether they be our kids, someone else's kids, our grandkids, to follow and serve our risen Lord, Jesus Christ. May we pray for the next generation of faithful believers who will lead and serve the future Church.
