We advertised this event in two main ways: One of our small groups took on the task of canvassing their neighborhood with door hangers including an invitation, a tract and some candy. 275 houses were contacted this way. The other way we advertised was by boosting posts on Facebook. Both of these venues cost a little bit, but it is well worth the investment, to be able to share Christ in our community."

Pastor Sheldon shares: "This group is similar to FAITH riders, who we've been learning about. They provide a motorcycle or another form of transportation for pastors overseas. A Word from Brad:

Understanding the Need: A Personal Insight into People's Greatest Need

Over the past few months, I've had conversations with more than a thousand people on the streets about a question that is crucial yet often overlooked: Where will you spend eternity?



These conversations took place during outreach events across seven of our KBA churches.

How I Engage in These Conversations (And You Can Too)

To start these discussions, I use Million-Dollar Bill tracts from LivingWaters.com, like the one shown above. Handing out these tracts serves as an icebreaker, inviting people to engage in a deeper, spiritual conversation. Here's how a typical conversation unfolds:

I start by saying, "Here is a million dollars for you." Almost without fail, people take the bill with curiosity, examining it closely. This is my chance to ask two vital questions. First, I ask, "Do you know what the million-dollar question is?" They almost always respond with a curious, "No." That's when I follow up with the most important question: "When you die, will you be in Heaven?"

A Simple Approach That Sparks Meaningful Conversations

This method allows me to engage in a spiritual conversation in less than 10 seconds. The steps are straightforward:

- 1. Hand the person a million-dollar bill.
- 2. Ask if they know the million-dollar question.
- 3. Follow up by asking if they know if they'll be in Heaven when they die.

The Responses

The answers I received varied widely. Roughly 75% of the people I spoke with replied with some variation of, "I don't know, maybe, I hope so, we'll see, or I wish I knew." Only a few responded with a confident "Yes" or "No."

Even among those who answered "Yes," I often asked a follow-up question: "What makes you think so?" One response stands out in my memory—a lady who said, "Absolutely." When I asked her why she was so certain, she replied, "Because I'm good." I promptly replied, "Let me tell you what the Bible says."

This tells us something important: a vast majority of people are uncertain about what they must do to get to Heaven. For many, it's a mystery.

A Call to the Church and Christians

This interaction highlights a broader issue: as the church and as individual Christians, we have often fallen short in sharing the truth about salvation. Many people don't realize that Jesus is the way to Heaven—that He is the door. Jesus Himself said, "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me."

A Word from Brad (cont.): Faith comes from hearing, and it's our responsibility to proclaim this truth. Let us be bold in telling people about Jesus, the only way to Heaven, so that they no longer have to wonder or be uncertain about eternity.

The greatest need people have is to find salvation from their lostness. Let's not waste any more time—let's share the good news of Jesus Christ boldly and urgently.

My dream is that one day, as I stand on a street corner and ask people where they'll spend eternity, every answer will be, "Yes, I'll be in Heaven because I know Jesus as my Lord and Savior."


New Life -Penn State: Eric Reiber
