Church members held their first annual Packing Party on November 16<sup>th</sup> with approximately 70 of their congregation attending including children and senior adults. Mr. Koppenheffer's goal was to pack 300 boxes, and they were able to pack 302. The church's Missions Development Council graciously provided the money for shipping cost.

# Word from Brad: The Biblical Model of the Shepherds



Luke chapter 2 presents a model that continues to inspire us today—a four-part model that remains relevant. The shepherds heard the good news about Jesus, they believed it, they shared it, and then they rejoiced in all they had heard and seen.

**First**, the shepherds heard the good news. In Luke 2:10, the angels declared, "I bring you good news of great joy." They weren't actively seeking this news, but when the angels shared

it, they listened. Romans 10:17 reminds us, "faith comes from hearing." The shepherds didn't question or argue with the angels. They didn't simply hear the good news about Jesus being born; their hearing led to action in the next three parts of this four-part model.

**Second**, after hearing the good news, they believed it. Luke tells us the shepherds wanted to see "this thing that has happened." They believed it had "happened." After hearing, they set out to see it for themselves. I liken this to a time when I was told about a big fire around the corner from where I lived. I immediately ran to see it. I didn't doubt the truth of what I'd heard; instead, I believed it and wanted to verify it with my own eyes. Similarly, the shepherds believed the angels and sought the joy of witnessing this incredible event. After hearing and believing, the shepherds naturally wanted to share the good news.

**Third**, the shepherds shared the good news of Jesus' birth. Luke tells us, "They spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child." The angels had hinted at the importance of spreading this news when they proclaimed it would be "good news of great joy that will be for all the people."

**Lastly**, Luke tells us that after hearing, believing, and sharing, the shepherds rejoiced. "The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told."

We can apply this model from Luke's story of the shepherds to our own lives. The good news of Jesus is to be heard, believed, shared, and then celebrated with great joy as we reflect on the process God has led us through.

May we all be faithful in every part of the process modeled by the shepherds who lived just outside Bethlehem over 2,000 years ago. Someday, it will be a joy to meet these shepherds and hear their testimonies of that extraordinary night when they first heard the good news of Jesus.
